

Chart 2: Child and young person **concern reports** from mandatory reporters






How many children and young people were involved in child and young person concern reports?

There were **53,424** children and young people involved in concern reports in the January to March 2020 quarter, a decrease of **1.7%** from the previous quarter.



Compared with the same quarter last year of **51,483**, this is an increase of 3.8%.







How many **children and young people** were involved in ROSH reports?

A total of **38,280** children and young people involved in ROSH reports in the January to March 2020 quarter. This translates to a decline of **3.4%** from the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter in the previous year of **36,681**, this is an increase of 4.4% or 1,599 children and young people.




Chart 6: Children and young people involved in ROSH reports




Child and young person **contacts** by mandatory reporters to the DCJ Child Protection Helpline

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Keeping children and young people safe

Children and young people entering care during the quarter




A total of **570** children and young people entered OOHC⁷ in the January to March 2020 quarter. This translates to a rise of **6.1%** or **33** children and young people, when compared with the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter last year of **501** children and young people entering care, this is an increase of 13.8% or 69 children and young people.

How many children and young people exited OOHC⁷ during the quarter?




There were 778 children and young people exiting OOHC⁷ in the January to March 2020 quarter. This is comparable to the result of the previous quarter.

Compared with the same quarter last year of 532 children and young people exiting OOHC7, this is an increase of 46.2% or 246 children and young people.

There were **13,552** children and young people in statutory OOHC⁷ at 31 March 2020. Of these 13,552 children, 42.0% or 5,697 were Aboriginal children and young people.

At 31 March 2020, a total of 16,213 children and young people were in OOHC7. This means a decrease of 5.5%, when compared with 17,162 reported at the same quarter end last year.

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Stable and nurturing environments for children and young people

Better placements and matching for children and young people in care

At 31 March 2020, there were **10,489** children and young people in OOHC with fewer than three placements.

This is equivalent to a decrease of **1.3%** or **134** children and young people from the end of the previous quarter.

Alternate permanent placement solutions for children and young people in need of care and protection

A total of **3,222** children and young people were on Guardianship Orders at 31 March 2020.

This is equivalent to an increase of **1.7%** or **55** children and young people from the end of the previous quarter.


Chart 2: Number of children and young people on Guardianship
