

Assessment of child and young person concern reports to determine if they meet the statutory ROSH threshold



Of the 60,019 ROSH reports reported to the DCJ Child Protection Helpline in this quarter,



How many children and young people were involved in child and young person concern reports?


There were **53,141** children and young people involved in concern reports in the April to June 2020 quarter, a decrease of **0.5%** from the previous quarter.



Compared with the same quarter last year of **52,109**, this is an increase of 2.0%.

How many **children and young people** were involved in **ROSH reports?**




A total of **39,241** children and young people involved in ROSH reports in the April to June 2020 quarter. This represents a rise of 2.5% from the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter in the previous year of **37,483**, this is an increase of 4.7% or 1,758 children and young people.

Chart 6: Children and young people involved in ROSH reports






Child and young person **contacts** by mandatory reporters to the DCJ Child Protection Helpline

The DCJ Child Protection Helpline received 36,228 child and young person contacts in the April to June 2020 quarter. This represents an increase of **3.0%** or **1,060** contacts, when compared with the previous quarter. Compared with the same quarter last year of 33,523, this is an increase of **8.1%** or **2,705** contacts.

Keeping children and young people safe

Children and young people entering care during the quarter



A total of **539** children and young people entered OOHC⁷ in the April to June 2020 quarter. This represents a reduction of **5.4%** or **31** children and young people, when compared with the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter last year of **586** children and young people entering care, this is a decrease of 8.0% or 47 children and young people.

How many children and young people exited OOHC⁷ during the quarter?



There were **637** children and young people exiting OOHC7 in the April to June 2020 quarter. This is a decrease of 18.1% or 141 children and young people from the previous quarter.

Compared with the same quarter last year of 655 children and young people exiting OOHC7, this is a decrease of 2.7% or 18 children and young people.

There were **13,556** children and young people in statutory OOHC⁷ at 30 June 2020. Of these 13,556 children, **42.2%** or **5,716** were Aboriginal children and young people.

Chart 3: Children and young people in statutory OOHC⁷ by Aboriginality and placement provider at quarter end




Placement of children and young people in need of care and protection

Placement Type

At 30 June 2020, a total of 16,160 children and young people were in OOHC7. This means a decrease of 4.3%, when compared with 16,884 reported at the same quarter end last year.


Stable and nurturing environments for children and young people

Better placements and matching for children and young people in care

At 30 June 2020, there were **10,391** children and young people in OOHC with fewer than three placements.

This is equivalent to a decrease of **0.9%** or **98** children and young people from the end of the previous quarter.

Alternate permanent placement solutions for children and young people in need of care and protection

A total of **3,267** children and young people were on Guardianship Orders at 30 June 2020.

This is equivalent to an increase of **1.4%** or **45** children and young people from the end of the previous quarter.


Chart 2: Number of children and young people on Guardianship
