Responding to child and young person concern reports



Child and young person concern reports received from reporter agencies and how these reports were classified

A total of **112,803** child and young person concern reports were received in the October to December 2020 quarter. Of these concern reports reported in the quarter,

- 61.9% met the risk of significant harm (ROSH) threshold,
- 29.6% were assessed as not meeting the ROSH threshhold, and
- **8.5%** were classified as other.



Chart 1: Child and young person concern reports






What were the primary Helpline assessed issues reported from mandatory reporter agencies?

The DCJ Child Protection Helpline received 93,313 child and young person concern reports in the October to December 2020 quarter.

Assessment of child and young person concern reports to determine if they meet the statutory ROSH threshold


There were 69,836 ROSH reports in the October to December 2020 guarter. This is equivalent to a decrease of **0.9%** from the previous quarter.



Compared with the same quarter last year of **58,496**, this represents a growth of 19.4%.

Determining a response time for **ROSH reports** from mandatory and non-mandatory reporters

Of the 69,836 ROSH reports reported to the DCJ Child Protection Helpline in this quarter,


13,910 reports were classified as requiring a response in 24 hours **30,124** reports were classified as requiring a response in 72 hours **24,529** reports were classified as requiring a response in 10 days.


How many children and young people were involved in child and young person concern reports?

There were **59,334** children and young people involved in concern reports in the October to December 2020 quarter, a decrease of **2.9%** from the previous quarter.



Compared with the same quarter last year of **54,328**, this is an increase of 9.2%.

Chart 5: Children and young people involved in concern reports






How many **children and young people** were involved in ROSH reports?

A total of **45,279** children and young people involved in ROSH reports in the October to December 2020 quarter. This translates to a decline of **1.9%** from the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter in the previous year of **39,631**, this is an increase of 14.3% or 5,648 children and young people.

Chart 6: Children and young people involved in ROSH reports by Aboriginality






Child and young person **contacts** by mandatory reporters to the DCJ Child Protection Helpline

The DCJ Child Protection Helpline received 40,400 child and young person contacts in the October to December 2020 quarter. This represents a decrease of 3.6% or 1,491 contacts, when compared with the previous quarter. Compared with the same quarter last year of **34,963**, this is an increase of **15.6%** or **5,437** contacts.

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Keeping children and young people safe

Children and young people entering care during the quarter




A total of **648** children and young people entered OOHC⁷ in the October to December 2020 quarter. This translates to a rise of **7.8%** or **47** children and young people, when compared with the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter last year of **537** children and young people entering care, this is an increase of 20.7% or 111 children and young people.

How many children and young people exited OOHC⁷ during the quarter?




There were **730** children and young people exiting OOHC⁷ in the October to December 2020 quarter. This is a decrease of **1.4%** or **10** children and young people from the previous quarter.

Compared with the same quarter last year of 776 children and young people exiting OOHC7, this is a decrease of 5.9% or 46 children and young people.

Chart 2: Children and young people exiting OOHC⁷ by age at exit




Children and young people in need of care and protection by placement provider

There were **13,504** children and young people in statutory OOHC⁷ at 31 December 2020. Of these 13,504 children, 43.3% or 5,848 were Aboriginal children and young people.

Chart 3: Children and young people in statutory OOHC⁷ by Aboriginality and placement provider at quarter end




Placement of children and young people in need of care and protection

Placement Type



At 31 December 2020, a total of 15,919 children and young people were in OOHC7. This means a decrease of 3.2%, when compared with 16,453 reported at the same quarter end last year.

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
Stable and nurturing environments for children and young people

Better placements and matching for children and young people in care

At 31 December 2020, there were **10,310** children and young people in OOHC with fewer than three placements.

This is similar to the result of the previous quarter.

Alternate permanent placement solutions for children and young people in need of care and protection


A total of **3,379** children and young people were on Guardianship Orders at 31 December 2020.

This is equivalent to an increase of **1.7%** or **57** children and young people from the end of the previous quarter.


Chart 2: Number of children and young people on Guardianship
