













Determining a response time for **ROSH reports** from mandatory and non-mandatory reporters

Of the 67,892 ROSH reports reported to the DCJ Child Protection Helpline in this quarter,

12,238 reports were classified as requiring a response in 24 hours **28,872** reports were classified as requiring a response in 72 hours **23,578** reports were classified as requiring a response in 10 days.

There were **62,170** children and young people involved in concern reports in the April to June 2021 quarter, an increase of **6.3%** from the previous quarter.



Compared with the same quarter last year of **53,141**, this is an increase of 17.0%.

Chart 5: **Children and young people** involved in **concern** reports




Chart 6: Children and young people involved in ROSH reports by Aboriginality



Children and young people entering care during the quarter




A total of **588** children and young people entered OOHC⁷ in the April to June 2021 quarter. This is comparable to the result of the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter last year of **539** children and young people entering care, this is an increase of 9.1% or 49 children and young people.

How many children and young people exited OOHC⁷ during the quarter?




There were **655** children and young people exiting OOHC⁷ in the April to June 2021 quarter. This is an increase of **0.8%** or **5** children and young people from the previous quarter.

Compared with the same quarter last year of 637 children and young people exiting OOHC7, this is an increase of 2.8% or 18 children and young people.

Children and young people in need of care and protection by case management responsibility

There were **13,572** children and young people in statutory OOHC⁷ at 30 June 2021. Of these 13,572 children, **44.0%** or **5,975** were Aboriginal children and young people.



Chart 3: Children and young people in statutory OOHC⁷ by Aboriginality and case management responsibility* at quarter end




Placement of children and young people in need of care and protection



At 30 June 2021, a total of 15,895 children and young people were in OOHC7. This means a decrease of 1.6%, when compared with 16,160 reported at the same quarter end last year.


Stable and nurturing environments for children and young people

Better placements and matching for children and young people in care

At 30 June 2021, there were **10,190** children and young people in OOHC with fewer than three placements.

This is equivalent to a decrease of **0.5%** or **53** children and young people from the end of the previous quarter.

Alternate permanent placement solutions for children and young people in need of care and protection

A total of **3,415** children and young people were on Guardianship Orders at 30 June 2021.

This is equivalent to an increase of **0.6%** or **22** children and young people from the end of the previous quarter.


Chart 2: Number of children and young people on Guardianship
