### Responding to child and young person concern reports



Child and young person concern reports received from reporter agencies and how these reports were classified

A total of **92,421** child and young person concern reports were received in the January to March 2022 quarter. Of these concern reports reported in the quarter,


- **59.9%** met the risk of significant harm (ROSH) threshold,
- 31.3% were assessed as not meeting the ROSH threshhold, and
- 8.8% were classified as other.

Chart 1: Child and young person concern reports






What were the primary Helpline assessed issues reported from mandatory reporter agencies?

Assessment of child and young person concern reports to determine if they meet the statutory ROSH threshold


There were **55,325** ROSH reports in the January to March 2022 quarter. This is equivalent to a decrease of 6.7% from the previous quarter.



Compared with the same quarter last year of 68,783, this represents a decline of 19.6%.

Determining a response time for **ROSH reports** from mandatory and non-mandatory reporters

Of the 55,325 ROSH reports reported to the DCJ Child Protection Helpline in this quarter,

**9,023** reports were classified as requiring a response in 24 hours **25,317** reports were classified as requiring a response in 72 hours **18,048** reports were classified as requiring a response in 10 days.




Chart 5: Children and young people involved in concern

How many children and young people were involved in child and young person concern reports?


There were **51,216** children and young people involved in concern reports in the January to March 2022 quarter, a decrease of **5.8%** from the previous quarter.



Compared with the same quarter last year of **58,483**, this is a decrease of 12.4%.


A total of **37,663** children and young people involved in ROSH reports in the January to March 2022 quarter. This translates to a decline of **6.1%** from the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter in the previous year of **44,419**, this is a decrease of **15.2%** or **6,756** children and young people.

Child and young person **contacts** by mandatory reporters to the DCJ Child Protection Helpline

The DCJ Child Protection Helpline received 33,788 child and young person contacts in the January to March 2022 quarter. This represents a decrease of **7.2%** or **2,640** contacts, when compared with the previous quarter. Compared with the same quarter last year of **39,719**, this is a decrease of **14.9%** or **5,931** contacts.

#### Children and young people entering care during the quarter




A total of **442** children and young people entered OOHC<sup>7</sup> in the January to March 2022 quarter. This represents a reduction of **14.5%** or **75** children and young people. when compared with the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter last year of **591** children and young people entering care, this is a decrease of 25.2% or 149 children and young people.

#### How many children and young people exited OOHC<sup>7</sup> during the quarter?




There were **644** children and young people exiting OOHC<sup>7</sup> in the January to March 2022 quarter. This is a decrease of 9.0% or 64 children and young people from the previous quarter.

Compared with the same quarter last year of 650 children and young people exiting OOHC7, this is a decrease of **0.9%** or **6** children and young people.

#### Children and young people in need of care and protection by case management responsibility


There were **13,151** children and young people in statutory OOHC<sup>7</sup> at 31 March 2022. Of these 13,151 children, **44.7%** or **5,885** were Aboriginal children and young people.

Chart 3: Children and young people in statutory OOHC<sup>7</sup> by Aboriginality and case management responsibility\* at quarter end




#### Placement of children and young people in need of care and protection



At 31 March 2022, a total of **15,301** children and young people were in OOHC7. This means a decrease of 3.8%, when compared with 15,900 reported at the same quarter end last year.

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

## Better placements and matching for children and young people in care

At 31 March 2022, there were **9,870** children and young people in OOHC with fewer than three placements.

This is equivalent to a decrease of **1.6%** or **165** children and young people from the end of the previous quarter.

## Alternate permanent placement solutions for children and young people in need of care and protection


A total of **3,483** children and young people were on Guardianship Orders at 31 March 2022.


Chart 2: Number of children and young people on Guardianship
