How many **individual clients** were seen in TEI from the first day of the financial year to the end of the quarter?

There were approximately **106K** individual clients who received TEI services from 1 July 2022 to 31 December 2022.

When compared with the same period in the previous year of **71K** individual clients who received TEI services, this is an increase of approximately **35K**.



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How many **group clients** were seen in TEI from the first day of the financial year to the end of the quarter?

There were approximately **585K** group clients who received TEI services from 1 July 2022 to 31 December 2022.

When compared with the same period in the previous year of **445K** group clients who received TEI services, this is an increase of approximately **139K**.




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How many **total sessions** were delivered in TEI from the first day of the financial year to the end of the quarter?

There were approximately **244K** TEI sessions delivered from 1 July 2022 to 31 December 2022.

When compared with the same period in the previous year of **235K** TEI sessions delivered, this is an increase of approximately **9K**.

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Child and young person concern reports



Child and young person concern reports received from reporter agencies and how these reports were classified


A total of **99,289** child and young person concern reports were received in the April to June 2023 quarter. Of these concern reports reported in the quarter,

- 56.7% met the risk of significant harm (ROSH) threshold,
- 33.5% were assessed as not meeting the ROSH threshhold, and
- 9.9% were classified as other.

Not meeting ROSH threshold Other




Assessment of child and young person concern reports to determine if they meet the statutory ROSH threshold

There were **56,263** ROSH reports in the April to June 2023 guarter. This is equivalent to a decrease of **2.1%** from the previous quarter.

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Children and young people involved in concern reports




How many **children and young people** were involved in child and young person **concern reports** during the quarter?

There were **54,520** children and young people involved in concern reports in the April to June 2023 quarter, a decrease of **1.3%** from the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter in the previous year of **52,765**, this is an increase of **3.3**%.





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How many **children and young people** were involved in **ROSH reports** during the quarter?


A total of **38,660** children and young people involved in ROSH reports in NSW in the April to June 2023 quarter This translates to a decline of **1.1%** from the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter in the previous year of **38,347**, this is an increase of **0.8%** or **313** children and young people.


How many **children and young people** were **seen** by a DCJ caseworker during the quarter?

A total of **7,463** children and young people involved in ROSH reports who were seen by a DCJ caseworker in NSW in the April to June 2023 quarter. This translates to a decline of **11.5%** from the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter in the previous year of **9,194**, this is a decrease of **18.8%** or **1,731** children and young people.

How many **children and young people** were **seen** by a DCJ caseworker from the first day of the financial year to the end of the quarter?

A total of **27,782** children and young people involved in ROSH reports who were seen by a DCJ caseworker from July 2022 to June 2023.


When compared with the same period in the previous year of **31,567** children and young people, this is a decrease of **3,785** children and young people were seen by a DCJ caseworker.

Chart 4: Children and young people involved in ROSH reports who were seen YTD




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What is the percentage of children and young people re-reported at ROSH within 12 months of case plan closure by the end of the guarter⁴?

By 30 June 2023, **32.8%** of children and young people were re-reported at ROSH within 12 months of case plan closure (Target 32.3% by June 2023).

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Keeping children and young people safe

Children and young people entering care during the quarter

A total of **570** children and young people entered OOHC in the April to June 2023 quarter. This translates to a rise of **8.8%** or **46** children and young people, when compared with the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter last year of **551** children and young people entering care, this is an increase of **3.4%** or **19** children and young people.

How many children and young people exited OOHC during the quarter?

There were **639** children and young people exiting OOHC in the April to June 2023 quarter. This is a decrease of **8.7%** or **61** children and young people from the previous quarter.

Compared with the same quarter last year of **638** children and young people exiting OOHC, this is comparable to the result of the same quarter last year.

There were **12,821** children and young people in statutory OOHC at 30 June 2023. Of these 12,821 children, **45.6%** or **5,842** were Aboriginal children and young people.




Placement of children and young people in need of care and protection

At 30 June 2023, a total of **14,723** children and young people were **in OOHC**. This means a decrease of **3.3%**, when compared with **15,223** reported at the same quarter end last year.

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
Stable and nurturing environments for children and young people

Better placements and matching for children and young people in care

At 30 June 2023, there were **9,528** children and young people in OOHC with fewer than three placements.

This is similar to the result of the previous quarter.

Alternate permanent placement solutions for children and young people in need of care and protection

A total of **3,442** children and young people were on Guardianship Orders at 30 June 2023.

This is equivalent to a decrease of **0.5%** or **18** children and young people from the end of the previous quarter.


Chart 2: Number of children and young people on Guardianship Orders by Aboriginalty and age group

At 30 June 2023, **71%** of Aboriginal children and young people in care were placed with an Aboriginal or non-Aboriginal relative or an Aboriginal carer.
