
Targeted Early Intervention (TEI) services - year to date (YTD) data



How many **individual clients** were seen in TEI from the first day of the financial year to the end of the quarter?

There were approximately **177K** individual clients who received TEI services from 1 July 2023 to 30 June 2024.

When compared with the same period in the previous year of **170K** individual clients who received TEI services, this is an increase of approximately **7K**.



How many **group clients** were seen in TEI from the first day of the financial year to the end of the quarter?

There were approximately **1,188K** group clients who received TEI services from 1 July 2023 to 30 June 2024.

When compared with the same period in the previous year of **1,134K** group clients who received TEI services, this is an increase of approximately **55K**





How many **total sessions** were delivered to individual clients in TEI from the first day of the financial year to the end of the quarter?

There were approximately **503K** TEI sessions delivered to individual clients from 1 July 2023 to 30 June 2024.

When compared with the same period in the previous year of **488K** TEI sessions delivered to individual clients, this is an increase of approximately **15K**.

Child and young person concern reports received from reporter agencies and how these reports were classified

A total of **105,561** child and young person concern reports were received in the April to June 2024 quarter. Of these concern reports

- 58.7% met the risk of significant harm (ROSH) threshold,
- 32.6% were assessed as not meeting the ROSH threshhold, and
- 8.7% were classified as other.


Assessment of child and young person concern reports to determine if they meet the statutory ROSH threshold

There were **61,933** ROSH reports in the April to June 2024 quarter. This is equivalent to a decrease of **0.6%** from the previous quarter.

Compared with the same quarter last year of **56,263**, this represents a growth of **10.1%**.

Determining a response time for **ROSH reports** from mandatory and non-mandatory reporters

Of the 61,933 ROSH reports reported to the DCJ Child Protection Helpline in this quarter,

8,751 reports were classified as requiring a response in 24 hours 29,312 reports were classified as requiring a response in 72 hours **22,521** reports were classified as requiring a response in 10 days.



How many **children and young people** were involved in child and young person concern reports during the quarter?

There were **56,951** children and young people involved in concern reports in the April to June 2024 quarter, an increase of **1.0%** from the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter in the previous year of **54,520**, this is an increase of 4.5%.





Chart 1: Children and young people involved in concern reports

How many **children and young people** were involved in **ROSH reports** during the quarter?

A total of 41,326 children and young people involved in ROSH reports in NSW in the April to June 2024 quarter. This represents a rise of **2.1%** from the previous quarter.


When compared with the same quarter in the previous year of **38,660**, this is an increase of **6.9%** or **2,666** children and young people.

Chart 2: Children and young people involved in ROSH reports² during the quarter




How many children and young people were seen by a DCJ caseworker during the quarter?

A total of **6,996** children and young people involved in ROSH reports who were seen by a DCJ caseworker in NSW in the April to June 2024 quarter. This represents a rise of **0.6%** from the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter in the previous year of **7,463**, this is a decrease of **6.3%** or **467** children and young people.

Chart 3: Children and young people involved in ROSH reports during the quarter who were seen3




How many children and young people were seen by a DCJ caseworker from the first day of the financial year to the end of the quarter?

A total of 24,234 children and young people involved in ROSH reports who were seen by a DCJ caseworker from July 2023 to June 2024.

When compared with the same period in the previous year of 27,782 children and young people, this is a decrease of 3,548 children and young people who were seen by a DCJ caseworker.

Chart 4: Children and young people involved in ROSH reports who were seen YTD






What is the percentage of children and young people re-reported at ROSH within 12 months of case plan closure by the end of the quarter⁴?

By 30 June 2023, **32.8%** of children and young people were re-reported at ROSH within 12 months of case plan closure (Target 32.3% by June 2023).

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Keeping children and young people safe

Children and young people entering care during the quarter

A total of **391** children and young people entered OOHC in the April to June 2024 quarter. This represents a reduction of 25.5% or 134 children and young people, when compared with the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter last year of **570** children and young people entering care, this is a decrease of 31.4% or 179 children and young people.

How many children and young people exited OOHC during the quarter?

There were **568** children and young people exiting OOHC in the April to June 2024 quarter. This is a decrease of 16.3% or 111 children and young people from the previous quarter.

Compared with the same quarter last year of **639** children and young people exiting OOHC, this is a decrease of 11.1% or 71 children and young people.

There were 13 children and young people in Special OOHC at the end of June 2024. This is a decrease of 18.8% or 3 children and young people when compared with the previous month. Compared with the same month of the previous year, the result is a decrease of 60.6% or 20 children and young people.



Better placements and matching for children and young people in care

At 30 June 2024, there were **8,944** children and young people in OOHC with fewer than three placements.

This is equivalent to a decrease of 1.3% or 118 children and young people from the end of the previous quarter.

Alternate permanent placement solutions for children and young people in need of care and protection

A total of **3,356** children and young people were on Guardianship Orders at 30 June 2024.

This is equivalent to a decrease of 1.8% or 60 children and young people from the end of the previous quarter.


